ESSENTIAL CIVIL WAR CURRICULUM

Richard G. Williams, Jr. writes about Virginia history and the War Between the States. A former contributor to the *Washington Times'* Civil War column, he has also written numerous articles about the Civil War for newspapers, magazines, and journals.
